COLLEEN HAYWARD AM BOARD MEMBER

Professor Colleen Hayward is a senior Noongar woman with extensive family links throughout the south-west of WA. She comes from a teaching family with both her parents and two siblings having been teachers. Her father was the first Aboriginal teacher, and Principal, in WA. She is currently Head of Kurongkurl Katitjin, Edith Cowan University's Centre for Indigenous Education and Research and was recently promoted to concurrently hold the position of Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Equity and Indigenous across the University.



For more than 30 years, Colleen has provided significant input to policies and programs on a wide range of issues, reflecting the needs of minority groups at community, state and national levels. She has an extensive background in a range of areas including health, education, training, employment, housing, child protection and law & justice as well as significant experience in policy and management. In much of this work, she draws on her qualifications including Bachelor of Education, Bachelor of Applied Science in Aboriginal Community Management and Development and a Post Graduate Certificate in Cross Sector Partnerships from Cambridge University.

Among her many achievements, she has been recognised for her long-standing work for and on behalf of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities across Australia by being named a finalist in the national Deadlys Awards in the category of Outstanding Achievement in Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Health (2008) and by winning the 2008 National NAIDOC Aboriginal Person of the Year Award. Colleen is also a recipient (2006) of the Premier of WA's prestigious Multicultural Ambassador's Award for advancing human rights and anti-racism in the community and is the 2009 inductee into the WA Department of Education's Hall of Fame for Achievement in Aboriginal Education. In 2011, she completed her term as a foundation member of the inaugural Board of the National Congress of Australia's First Peoples. In 2012, Colleen was inducted into the Western Australian Women's Hall of Fame, was recognised as a Member in the General Division of the Order of Australia and made a Western Australian Ambassador for Children and Young People.

JOHN MCGLUE BOARD MEMBER

John McGlue is Principal of investment firm Riwaka Capital.

He is a former Chairman Australia of FTI Consulting Strategic Communications, one of the world's leading financial communications firms.

John was born and educated in Ireland before moving to Australia in 1987.

John is a former Business Editor and State Political Editor of The West Australian newspaper. For some years, he was also a columnist with The Australian newspaper.

CREATIVE JOURNEYS

Creative Journeys was a unique interactive art exhibition presented by Celebrate WA and curated by Nomad Two Worlds. Prominent and emerging Indigenous artists presented and created original artwork, while sharing their stories in an exhibit free to the public. The exhibition presented in four contemporary pop-up galleries created from refashioned outlets within Carillon City Perth, was fresh, innovative and encouraged public engagement. The exhibition was held from Friday 1 to Sunday 3 June with pieces displayed over the entire WA Day long weekend.



WA DAY PLATE

The inaugural WA Day Plate, held at Belmont Park Racecourse on Saturday 2 June, was a free event supported by Perth Racing. More than 2,800 punters were at the track to see the races double the number of attendees expected by Perth Racing. The WA Day Plate was won by Solsay, the four-year-old gelding, who started as the favourite, was ridden by Hayley Diener and trained by Sharon Taylor. The Celebrate WA Handicap was won by McScar and ridden by Renee Forrest. Premier Colin Barnett MLA presented the WA Day Plate trophy. The Premier praised apprentice jockey Hayley Diener's ride on Solsay, as well as the all-female jockey-trainer winning team.



THE WESTERN AUSTRALIAN OF THE YEAR AWARDS

The inaugural refreshed Western Australian of the Year Awards were presented on the evening of Saturday, 2 June at the Grand Ballroom, Burswood Entertainment Complex. More than 480 people attended the gala event and witnessed Professor Kim Scott named as the first ever Western Australian of the Year. Guests were treated to laughs throughout the evening courtesy of comedian Peter Rowsthorn, Master of Ceremonies. Musical entertainment was provided by local leading lady of screen and stage, Lucy Durack, together with well known Australian artists, Mark Seymour, James Reyne and Ricki Lee Coulter.

Formerly known as the WA Citizen of the Year Awards, which were first presented in 1972, the Awards have a rich history of acknowledging Western Australia's highest achievers across a range of different industries and categories. In 2012 the Awards celebrated their 40th year as well as a new name – The Western Australian of the Year Awards. This new name recognises the Awards' position as the State's highest honours. Designed to represent the 'best of the best' the Awards reflect the highest level of contribution made to Western Australia by those either born in WA, or those who have chosen to call WA home.

This year the Award categories were streamlined from 14 categories to six; Youth, Business and Professions, Community, Arts and Culture, Indigenous and Sport.

In 2012, 64 nominations for the various Awards were received, of which 23 finalists were selected. In another new and exciting initiative, the first ever Western Australian of the Year was announced - chosen from the winners of the six categories. In recognition of the Awards' history, a new seal element was developed 'Celebrating 40 Years', providing context and tradition to the new name.

STATE OF THE ART MUSIC FESTIVAL

Celebrate WA's first State of the Art music festival was, by any standard, a huge success. Marketed primarily as an all-ages youth event and with ticket prices starting at just \$10 + ticketing fees (under 18's), the event drew a huge and appreciative crowd. State of the Art was showcased at the Perth Concert Hall and on surrounding outdoor stages on Sunday 3 June.

More than 5,500 Western Australian music fans flocked to this 11-hour music extravaganza which featured 21 local bands and musicians, including bestselling bands Eskimo Joe, Hoodoo Gurus and Jebediah together with hip-hop artist Drapht and many more. State of the Art was a true celebration of Western Australia's musical achievements and the high calibre of musicians Western Australia continues to produce.

VIDEO COMPETITION

Celebrate WA's State-wide video competition 'Capture the spirit of celebrating WA' launched in April 2012. The video competition aimed to engage Western Australians from across our vast State.

The video competition had two categories: 12-25 Year Olds and Open. Videos were to answer the question 'How do you celebrate WA?'. A People's Choice Award was awarded, with voting for this open until midnight Sunday 3 June.

Videos were submitted and viewed through Celebrate WA's new website launched in 2012: www.celebratewa.com.au. Winners were announced on Monday 4 June with these successful short movie producers garnering positive media for their work on both television and radio. COMMUNITY BBQS

Celebrate WA teamed with Bunnings Warehouse to provide 32 Community BBQs across our State, from Esperance to Broome on the Monday public holiday. Coles supported this initiative through the provision of produce, with all monies raised donated to community groups such as Rotary, Scouts and local sporting clubs.

WA DAY DERBY

The Western Australian Football League (WAFL) hosted a WA Day Derby on Monday 4 June. Old intra-state rivalries were on show as two derbies were held on the day – the Fremantle Derby at Fremantle Oval and the Perth Derby at Arena Joondalup.

Both games drew the biggest crowds of the season, with Fremantle Oval welcoming more than 6,500 footy fans through their gates and Arena Joondalup almost 5,000 fans. The WA Day Derby was a fitting way to round out the first-ever WA Day long weekend celebrations and an appropriate testament to our State's great sporting culture.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1987 of Western Australia. The council has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Basis of Preparation

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1987 of Western Australia and the following applicable Accounting Standards:

AASB 101: Presentation of Financial

Statements

AASB 107: Cash Flow Statements

AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in

Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 110: Events after the Balance Sheet Date

AASB 1031: Materiality

No other applicable Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

(a) Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The association relies on the financial support of various funding bodies and where the support is not forthcoming, a going concern basis of preparation would not be appropriate.

(b) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(c) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(d) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by the Council to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(e) Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the association are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

(f) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

(g) Revenue

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Sponsorship income and pledged donations are only recognised on receipt, unless the sponsorship amount is confirmed in writing and in the opinion of the Council is recoverable.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

(i) Government Grants

Government grants are recognised as revenue in the period when control is obtained. If the revenue transfer is non-reciprocal, then grants are recognised on receipt.

(j) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.
